 - World – **1,360,039** confirmed **75,973** deaths, **291,991** recovered

 - United States – **368,449** confirmed, **10,993** deaths, **19,919** recovered

 - Missouri (DHSS 04.06.2020 1400) – **31,654** Tests Completed, **2,722** confirmed, **39** deaths

Baseline = median value for the corresponding day of the week during the 5-week period Jan 3-Feb 6, 2020

 - Retail and Recreation – Down 18% compared to baseline
 - *Includes restaurants, cafes, theaters, libraries, shopping centers.*
 - Grocery and pharmacy – Up 19% compared to baseline
 - *Includes grocery stores, drug stores, pharmacies, farmers markets*
 - Workplace – Down 26% compared to baseline
 - *Includes places of work*
 - Residential – Up 9% compared to baseline
 - *Includes places of residence*

Response

- Barry County Coordinated Response
 - Barry County Joint Operations – Health Department and Emergency Management
 - Continue to meet with community organizations, local government officials, businesses, and citizens to provide the most current information regarding our ongoing response to the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - Continue to monitor; Response Capabilities, Public and Responder Information and resource needs.
 - Declaration Status
 - Barry County – Emergency declaration signed by Barry County Commission on 03.23.2020.
 - Barry OEM/EOC – continues to monitor the situation and coordinate with partners and BCHD (Lead Response Agency.)
 - Barry County Health Department – Emergency declaration signed by Health Department Board of Trustees on **03.31.2020**. The declaration prohibits gatherings with greater than 10 people, required social distancing of a minimum of 6 feet between unrelated people, restriction to curbside or drive-thru restaurant service as well as **defining essential and non-essential businesses**. **Under these rules, non-essential businesses must remain closed and essential businesses must modify their business to provide for required social distancing. The current declaration expires 11:59 p.m. April 30, 2020.**
 - Missouri - Governor Parsons declared an emergency on March 13, 2020

- DR 4409 Major Disaster Declaration approved by President on 03.25.2020.
- MO DHSS implemented a statewide stay at home order on 04.04.2020, effective 04.06.2020 12:00 a.m. through 04.24.2020 11:59 p.m.
- United States – President Trump declared a National emergency on March 13, 2020. This Stafford Act declaration is for Category B Emergency Protective Measures. Additionally President Trump has activated the Defense Production Act.

COVID-19

- **Anyone can contract COVID-19 – everyone should take appropriate precautions.**

- Risk Factors – Those at highest risk of contracting COVID-19 are older adults (60+yrs.), chronic medical conditions such as heart disease, diabetes, and lung disease. This does not mean that younger and healthy people will not contract COVID-19; they are simply at a much lower risk.
- Symptoms
 - Fever
 - Cough
 - Shortness of breath
- What to do if you are:
 - Symptomatic – STAY HOME.
 - Call your primary care provider and inform them of your symptoms.
 - If you have serious breathing problems dial 911 and tell them about your symptoms.
 - Follow your PCP directions.
 - Do not have close personal contact or share spaces with others.
 - Non-Symptomatic – Practice good prevention. Remember COVID-19 is spreading person to person and all people may contract the disease and pass it to others, even if they do not have symptoms. Avoid close personal contact with others and especially those at greatest risk.

Preparedness

- Individual Preparation and Response – Be prepared to recover at home, as most people will be able to remain at home. Ensure that you have sufficient supplies for 2-3 weeks, it is not necessary to have large quantities of supplies.
 - Prevention –
 - Wash your hands often.
 - Avoid touching high contact surfaces in public places. If you must touch surfaces, use a cloth, sleeve, glove, or a single finger. Then use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol to clean your hands.
 - Avoid touching your face, nose, and eyes or clean your hands before touching your face.
 - Clean and disinfect your home and car, especially frequently touched surfaces, with antimicrobial cleaners or bleach water (1/3 cup of bleach per gallon.)
 - Avoids crowds, especially indoors.
 - Avoid non-essential travel, especially foreign travel.
- Community Spread – COVID-19 is, most commonly spread, through droplets expelled from the mouth or nose of infected individuals onto other people and surfaces.
- Close Personal Contact - Droplet contamination is most likely to occur when you are within 6' of an infected person for an extended time (such as when providing direct care) or when coming in direct contact with the droplets (usually through a cough.) There is a very low risk of contamination between persons who are outside of the 6' radius, such as when shopping in the same store.
- Social Distancing - It is important to limit personal contact to 6 feet or greater. Experience with the 1918 Spanish Flu Pandemic demonstrated the effectiveness of social distancing in stopping the spread of a pandemic flu. Limiting close personal contact and avoiding large groups is an effective way to “flatten the curve” of new infections.
- Panic Buying –There is **no indication** that we will experience long-term shortages of food or other household items. Panic buying has caused immediate shortages, which may cause those with mobility and access issues difficulty in obtaining the regular supplies they need.
